It is the honour of my life to be elected to lead Ealing Council on an agenda of change, and of doing things differently.

I will lead an open, inclusive and transparent council, that will engage people – including you – in the challenges we face together.



And there are some big challenges ahead:

- Recovering from the pandemic and lockdown, bringing well paid jobs back to Ealing; and delivering the next generation of council houses and genuinely affordable homes
- Tackling the climate crisis, greening our borough, cleaning our air, and ensuring that the borough we build is sustainable, thereby enhancing our character as both the 'Queen of the Suburbs' and a place in London with a deep industrial heritage

Relentlessly fighting the poverty and inequality that blights too many lives and holds too many people back from fulfilling their dreams and their aspirations. In the first few days of the new administration, I made a number of announcements about how we will work to tackle air quality, readdress regeneration, tackle discrimination, as well as encouraging active travel. You can read more about these on this page six.

I want to give you my commitment that my focus will be on changing Ealing for the better.

Not for you, but with you.

You can read a bit more about the team I've brought together to lead that change on the facing page.

I love Ealing and this is a new chapter for all of us. I can't wait to start working with you to make our borough an even better place to live and work.

I visited Warren Farm recently to discuss the future of the site with local people from the Warren Farm Nature Reserve Campaign and the Brent River Canal Society. I want to ensure we can preserve the wild character of Warren Farm as a place for local people to enjoy nature, as well as deliver community sports facilities we know people need. I think we can find a compromise that the people of Hanwell and Southall deserve,

and I am going to work to find out how we can get there.



THREE NEW PRIORITIES

- Decent living incomes
- Action on the climate emergency
- Tackling poverty and inequality



The following councillors will be joining the new leader in the cabinet:

Climate Action – Councillor Deirdre Costigan (deputy leader) will be working on greening and keeping Ealing clean, achieving net zero carbon, and ensuring our parks, open spaces and nature are protected and enhanced.

Decent Living Incomes – Councillor Bassam Mahfouz will be working on bringing new and well-paid jobs back to Ealing and securing a strong economic recovery where good businesses can thrive.

Inclusive Economy – Councillor Steve Donnelly will be working to build wealth within the community by ensuring everything the council does increases social value and contributes to making Ealing a fairer place to live and work.

Genuinely Affordable Homes – Councillor Lauren Wall will be working on the council's radical programme of social rent council house building, and ensuring tenants are empowered and have ownership of their communities.

Good Growth – Councillor Shital Manro will be making sure the growth that takes place in Ealing enhances its character, conserves its future and makes great places people want to live. **Thriving Communities – Councillor Jasbir Anand** will be focusing on bringing people together to build strong neighbourhoods, empowering volunteers, encouraging community activism, engaging civic and faith leaders, and delivering well-loved community facilities and services.

A Fairer Start – Councillor Kamaljit Kaur Nagpal will be working on ensuring all our children and young people of all backgrounds get the best start in life, from their earliest years through to a great education.

Tackling inequality – Councillor Aysha Raza will provide a relentless focus on reducing poverty and inequality for those who most need support – and on promoting wellbeing and safety for all.

Healthy Lives – Councillor Josh Blacker will be working on combating COVID-19, protecting and enhancing the physical and mental health of all, and supporting our older residents to stay independent and resilient.

Open to change

The council's new cabinet has set out a number of changes in direction and new priorities and has pledged to create a more open and transparent way of doing things – with residents at the heart of decision-making. Here are some of the first actions they have taken.

LTNS

Ealing Council's new leadership team has reassured local people in all low traffic neighbourhood (LTN) areas that they will have the final say on the trial schemes. This will be achieved by a consultation on each LTN in the borough, keeping schemes that work and are supported, and removing those that do not. The council has already announced the end of the trial West Ealing South scheme (LTN 21), following the decision by Hounslow Council to close Swyncombe Avenue for two months. The council will be looking to consult on smaller sections of LTN 21 that local people have said are successful. Residents will be

consulted before implementation, and nothing will be installed until after they have had the final say.

TACKLING INEQUALITY

The new administration has committed to implementing the recommendations of the Ealing Race Equality Commission in full; and has given its chairman Lord Simon Woolley backing to continue taking a tough and independent approach.

To back this up, Councillor Aysha Raza was appointed as the council's first ever cabinet member for tackling inequality. She said: "We are putting tackling

> inequality at the very heart of everything we do as a council. I will be focusing on reducing the inequalities that hold back far too many of our communities and fighting the hate and discrimination that has no place in our borough."

DEVELOPMENT

The council will be taking a new approach to development that will put community-led development in the driving seat of regeneration – and make the process as transparent as possible.

This approach will ask more of developers, focusing on bringing back good jobs and employment for local people, re-greening neighbourhoods and maintaining genuinely affordable homes as the priority for any developer looking to build in the borough. Among the planned measures will be an immediate review of council policy on tall buildings; new town development plans created with communities; a publicly accessible register of any meetings between developers and councillors; and the mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, has been asked to help produce a new vision for the development of Southall, revoking the Opportunity Area Framework.

SOUTHALL GASWORKS

Council leader Peter Mason has written to members of residents' group CASH setting out the urgent steps he has instructed officers to take to address issues of air quality around the old Southall gasworks.

The wide-ranging measures that council officers are now going to be carrying out include: Commissioning legal advice on the feasibility of a statutory abatement notice; giving CASH the opportunity to be involved in deciding the contract for monitoring air quality; drawing up a plan to include CASH and the wider community in developing an air quality strategy for Southall; and starting work on setting up independent complaint monitoring.

'Get it done'

Huge numbers of you have now received at least one dose of the **coronavirus vaccine**, with more than 170,800 having had at least one jab by 25 May. *Jack Butler reports*.

y mid-May, anyone aged 30 or above was eligible to walk up to a mass vaccination centre and get their vaccine if they have not booked an appointment at one already. Keep an eye on www.gov.uk/coronavirus and nhs.uk/coronavirus for the latest on who is eligible for a vaccine.

It is best to book a jab on the NHS website because walk-ups do not guarantee a vaccination slot, but if you are eligible you can just go along if you want to.

Getting the vaccine is the best way of protecting yourself and others against COVID-19.





Chloe Bassi is a local student and has had both doses of her AstraZeneca vaccine. She said: "I didn't really get any side effects; it was perfectly fine. I was in work the next day and now it means I can go back to normal, really.

SURGE TESTING

From 24 May, a five-week period of extra, targeted COVID-19 testing was started by the council and Public Health England after small clusters were identified across London of a variant of concern first identified in India. Any tests that came back positive would be sequenced by the national Test and Trace programme to try and track the variant and better understand it. GET TESTED

It has always been important to get tested regularly, but now more than ever because of the new variant. We are asking residents to get tested, even if you have no symptoms, to help to prevent transmission on to others, including those who may be more vulnerable. Testing has been increased in the borough, with anyone over the age of 16 being encouraged to get a test. This can be done at testing sites across the borough, as well as at more than 50 local pharmacies, which can be booked on the council's website. STAY SAFE

Councillor Josh Blacker, the council's cabinet member for healthy lives, said: "As we hopefully move towards leaving lockdown restrictions behind us on 21 June, which we are all excited about, it is important to remember that caution will still remain in many aspects of life and that lots of us will not yet have had both doses of the vaccine until later in the summer.

"As we move towards more normality and things begin to open up further, it is still vital to continue to follow public health guidance. This includes the golden rule of 'Hands, Face, Space' which is one of the best ways to stay safe when outside of your home."

A foul habit



Dog owners and walkers are being reminded by Ealing Council to clean up after their animals because a small number of irresponsible residents have been leaving the mess behind.

It is illegal to not pick up **dog poo** from any public place or footpath that is left by your dog or a dog you are looking after. Failure to do so can result in a £150 on the spot fine and/or court action.

Dog mess should be wrapped in a plastic bag and put into a litter bin or taken home for disposal with household rubbish. There are almost 1,000 public litter bins across the borough so there is no excuse not to dispose of the droppings.

Sowing seeds of chance

Up-and-coming local projects are being given a helping hand to grow and flourish thanks to the Future Ealing Fund, which has been set up to support local people with big ideas about improving the local community. Dan Stephens reports.

aunched in March as a further development of Ealing Council's previous Transform your Space (TyS) initiative, the Future Ealing Fund provides financial support to community-led ideas that help the recovery of business, neighbourhoods and the local area.

A share of the £100,000 fund is available up to a maximum of £10,000 and is being offered as a pledge towards people's active crowdfunding campaigns. SKILLS, SOCIALISING...AND FOOD One project which could benefit from funding is the DIG scheme in Green Lane, Hanwell, which has been working to transform an unused garden area with the aim of creating regular opportunities for local people to learn about gardening and horticulture.

The burgeoning project is being led by the social enterprise Cultivate London and, as DIG co-founder Sylvia Cordell explained, it is all about supporting the local community: "We want to enable local people to have job-ready skills.

"Our programme of activities will address mental health, wellbeing and social isolation, among much more, and will be available to everyone who wants to get involved.

"We will also produce organic food that will be shared by the participants – and any surplus will be offered to food banks."

'FUNDS IN THE HANDS OF LOCAL PEOPLE'

TyS backed 25 local initiatives over five years to help turn neglected and underused pockets of space into community assets – and Future Ealing is building on this success by significantly broadening the scope of future projects.

Projects looking to bring the local community together, improve public spaces and high streets, create hubs and help reduce the borough's carbon footprint could all be eligible for a share of the fund.

Community groups, mutual aid or volunteer networks, charities, tenant or residents' associations or social enterprises are all encouraged to get involved.

Councillor Jasbir Anand, the council's cabinet member for thriving communities, said: "Our Future Ealing Fund aims to transform the borough for people who live and work here; and we are putting funding in the hands of local people to help residents to do more in their local areas and help us achieve that."

The council will be announcing the first projects to receive Future Ealing Funding in June. But there will be another chance to apply if you have a great idea because a second round of the Future Ealing Fund will be launched in the autumn.

'Life is coming back'

It was described as being 'like a new beginning' as a local charity shop with an important role in the community was able to reopen and the borough's high streets emerged from the latest lockdown.

APE is a small charity that provides vital mental health services for Ealing residents, through one-to-one psychological support.

Ealing Council contracts CAPE to provide those services, but the charity also runs a shop in Churchfield Road, Acton. Among other things, the shop provides volunteering work to some CAPE clients to help rebuild their confidence and support them to establish work-like routines and find work again.

The pandemic hit the shop hard, like so many others, but it managed to keep going, not least thanks to grants it received from the council.

"The discretionary grants helped sustain us through potential insolvency,



meaning we will not be another shop closure statistic and have been able to open again with a bright new shop layout," said Patsy Richardson, the shop's non-executive director.

"We are very grateful for financial support from the council in the form of a business grant, and a rate relief grant. These have made a critical difference to the shop being able to stay viable through the lockdown, and re-open now. We would also like to thank the generosity of the local community and our landlord who have all supported us through the lockdown.

"We've all helped each other and come out the other end of the lockdowns. It had been touch-and-go at times.

"Reopening the shop was huge. It's a new beginning."

'LIFE IS COMING BACK'

"Thanks to our close collaboration with the council," said Patsy, "our CAPE shop remains a cheerful community presence in Churchfield Road, providing a hub for the local community. Proceeds from the shop go back to the main charity – providing local services at a time when mental health funding is needed more than ever.

"It's been exciting, quite frankly, to reopen and be in the community again. The work we do is very community based and it is nice to see the road busy and the shop full. Lots of life is coming back."

Patsy added that the shop also took the opportunity provided by the lockdowns to increase its resale of donated second-hand clothes and

More than 33,000 active travel journeys have so far been made by pupils, staff and parents in our borough and Oaklands Primary School bikk in Hanwell has had great success in Bef helping pupils get involved. It has been to h as high as 31st in the entire country.

Councillor Deirdre Costigan, cabinet member for climate action, said: "Congratulations to Oaklands and all our schools participating in the Big Pedal Challenge. It is a great way of encouraging young people to walk and cycle as we look to increase the active travel journeys right across the borough."

CYCLING SUPPORT

Cycle training and cycle maintenance is available through the regular Dr Bike sessions taking place at locations across the borough this summer. Further cycling training for adults and children is available

alongside hiring of dockless bikes, and much more – including a Try Before You Bike scheme that allows you to hire a bike before deciding to buy it.

Karolina Malinowska said: "I've definitely caught the cycling bug. I decided on Try Before You Bike because, having not cycled since childhood, I was not sure if commuting on a bike is for me. But I absolutely love it and can't recommend this flexible service highly enough. My daughter loves cycling around in her seat that I ordered with the bike and we went on many fantastic days out last summer."

them in a clear, secure bag on top of your blue bin. Shoes, bags, belts, socks and underwear can also be recycled as part of your kerbside collection. Keep the bags dry and alongside each other and tie any pairs of shoes together. Recycling left

in black rubbish bags will not be collected.

Alternatively, you can take unwanted cast-offs to a textile collections bin near to your home. You can find your nearest one at www.ealing.gov.uk/recycling

'THE LAST THING WE WANT'

Councillor Deirdre Costigan, the council's cabinet member for climate action, said: "The last thing we want is clothes and textiles being sent off to landfill when they could be re-used, reloved or recycled. As it is, 'fast fashion' is responsible for lots of waste in the production cycle. But, on top of that, every year hundreds of thousands of tonnes of used clothing gets dumped in UK landfill unnecessarily – damaging the environment, as well as wasting resources and your money."

No complaints with career path

"I had always thought apprenticeships were for school leavers," said Natalie Burrage, who became an **apprentice** at 31 to restart her career after a tragedy made her rethink her future.

atalie is now a complaints officer for Ealing Council's adults and children's services. It is a job she gained after completing a one-year apprenticeship last year. Not only was she given a full-time position at the council, but she was also named Apprentice of the Year.

It was a well-deserved achievement which crowned a process that had taken her on quite a journey.

She said: "I left school early with no qualifications and I started working full time at the age of 18. I spent seven years working at McDonald's, followed by four years at Ladbrokes. Having three children, I was not really thinking about a career. I just wanted to earn some money and go home to my family.

"In 2018 my husband passed away. I realised that life is short; and I wanted to do more with my life – to better myself and make my children proud.

"I received an Ealing News Extra

email [from the council] with information on apprenticeships. I had always thought apprenticeships were for school leavers, but I was happy to see there was no upper age limit requirement. It was difficult to decide whether it would be worth taking a pay cut for a year, possibly more, and work in such a different environment but I decided to apply and see how it goes. I'm so glad I did."

During the apprenticeship, Natalie had to study alongside doing her work and needed to take exams to get key qualifications, but she said the training and advice she received proved 'very supportive and helpful.'

She added: "An apprenticeship is a great way to start a career and get qualifications. It's a good foot in the door and Ealing is an amazing place for apprentices."
